





Membership Fees for 2016

In order to better serve our membership in an increasingly challenging operating environment, the Valley of Washington has made the difficult decision to raise annual dues. We have held the line as long as possible—so much so that this is the first dues increase in more than ten years. But even as we find ways to do more with less, we must face the hard reality that we need to raise dues to continue providing you with the extensive and high quality membership benefits you have come to enjoy and expect with the DC Scottish Rite. The annual membership fee for the Valley of Washington, beginning in the 2016 dues year, has been increased to \$95.00, and will be reflected on the statement that you will receive from the Supreme Council in the September-October timeframe.

In 2016, the Endowed Life Membership (ELM) fee will also be increased, and will be equal to twenty times the thencurrent annual dues amount. Thus, the ELM rate for 2016 will be \$1900.00. With an ELM you never pay dues again while making an investment in the future of Scottish Rite Freemasonry in the nation's capital. You'll receive all the benefits of regular membership for as long as you live. It's an exceptional value and an easy way to make sure you've always got the Scottish Rite as your wingman. Brethren wishing to avail themselves of an ELM at the current rate of \$1300.00, or those currently enrolled in an ELM payment pan, must pay this amount in full prior to December 31, 2015.

Fulfilling our mission to deliver the best possible Reunion experience for our newest members also necessitates a very modest increase in our Petition fee. Beginning with the Spring 2016 Reunion, the fee to Petition for the Scottish Rite Degrees will be \$495.

We truly value your membership in the Valley of Washington and are committed to providing you with a quality Scottish Rite experience.

IS YOUR CARD VALID?

If your Scottish Rite membership card is not sporting the current year's validation sticker, perhaps you have not yet paid your dues. Please remember that your timely payment of dues signifies your dedication as a Scottish Rite Mason, and is critical in supporting the Rite's mission and smooth card. Please remember that dues are payable in advance and should be submitted prior to the start of the dues year. For instance, 2016 dues are to be paid NO LATER THAN December 31,

2015. So, take a second to look at your card. Is it valid and up to date? Do you still owe dues? If you have already paid your dues for this year — thank you!

We have also began to move forward with replacing the incandescent lighting in

the auditorium and 16th Street foyer, which will both improve the illumination, and reduce the cost of operation. The first phase of this project will be completed prior to our Valley team's conferral of the 33° on August 25th. Our ultimate plan is to continue replacing all of the lighting in the building with something more energy efficient, and with a longer life.

Another item of improvement being tackled during our meeting hiatus is to have the pipe organ thoroughly tuned and registered. The cost of a full restoration of this 75-year-old instrument is substantial, and unless there is an "angel" among you that would be willing underwrite that cost, it is not in our near-term plans. By doing the work that is currently planned, we hope to establish a real baseline to better understand where we need to go with it in the future. Please bear in mind that a not insignificant part of maintaining the health of the organ is to have it regularly played, and I would welcome any among the Brethren who have that ability to step up and help in that regard.





THE HOUSE of the TEMPLE CENTENNIAL

ot only is 2015 a year for the Supreme Council's Biennial Session, it also marks the centennial anniversary of the House of the Temple, our near-neighbor to the south on Sixteenth Street. This "stately edifice," located a little over a mile from the White House, was designed by noted architect John



Russell Pope as his first monumental commission, and serves as the home of the Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States of America.

This year, the House of the Temple Dedication Reenactment will be held on Saturday, August 22nd, preceding the Biennial Session. While not likely

A report from Daniel Huertas, 32° and Dmitriy Minin, 32°, Co-Leaders, DC Scottish Rite Tough Mudders





Your Good Health Tip

"Mad dogs and Englishmen go out in the midday sun."

Noel Coward, in his popular 1931 song, "Mad Dogs and Englishmen", described the good sense most inhabitants of the tropics have in avoiding exposure to the sun when at meridian. In the twenty-first century that midday sun is even more intense and we know more about the damage it is doing to our health.

Men, much more than women, fall short in skin cancer knowledge and prevention — and men are paying the price. In a new survey, just 51 percent of US men reported using sunscreen in the past 12 months, and an alarming 70 percent did not know the warning signs of skin cancer. "The survey results confirm what I see in my practice every day — men just aren't incorporating sun protection into their lives," said Joshua Zeichner, MD, assistant professor of dermatology at Mount

Sinai Medical Center in New York City. "The findings are especially concerning for men over age 50, who are more than twice as likely as women to die from melanoma." Exposure to the sun's ultraviolet (UV) radiation is associated with the vast majority of skin cancers, making a regular sun protection regimen an important part of a healthy lifestyle.



The truth is, with a few minor lifestyle adjustments, men (and women) can easily reduce their skin cancer risk to a minimum, without sacrificing time outdoors. Here's how:

- Seek the shade between 10 AM and 4 PM, when the sun is most intense. Schedule outdoor activities such as yard work, running errands, sports, and walking the dog in early morning or late afternoon.
- Cover up with clothing, including a broad-brimmed hat and UV-blocking sunglasses. Most skin cancers develop on skin that receives a lot of sun exposure. Long pants and long-sleeved shirts cover more skin. And while a baseball cap is better than nothing, it's far better to wear a broad-brimmed hat (like an outback or bucket hat), which will shade the often exposed neck and tops of the shoulders as well as the face. Close-fitting, UV-blocking sunglasses help protect the eyes and surrounding areas.
- Wear a broad spectrum (UVA/UVB) sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher every day. For extended outdoor activity, use a water-resistant, broad spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 30+. Apply one ounce 30 minutes before heading outside, and reapply every two hours, or immediately after swimming or sweating heavily.
- Examine your skin head-to-toe every month. If you spot suspicious lesions, you increase your chances of detecting skin cancers at an early stage, when they are easiest to cure. Take the time to learn how to perform skin self-exams.
- See your physician every year for a professional skin exam. Just 21 percent of the survey's male respondents said they were likely to see a medical professional for a skin exam this year!
