As always, thank you for being a Scottish Rite Mason. A


American University Graduate Student Receives Inaugural SR Iversen Scholarship

alman Haji is the inaugural recipient of the Charles and Eleanor Iversen DC Scottish Rite Scholarship for graduate students in the School of International Service (SIS). When Haji heard the news, he was ecstatic.

"I am so thankful and honored to receive this award," said Haji, who is a master's student in the Intercultural and International Communication program. "I know that generous donors have supported and motivated me to focus on my studies and pursue my aspirations."

The DC Scottish Rite, an appendant body of Freemasonry, established the Charles and Eleanor Iversen DC Scottish Rite Scholarship to be awarded to SIS graduate students who demonstrate financial need. The endowed

scholarship, which will provide \$5,000 each year to an SIS graduate student, is named in honor of Charles Iversen, Sovereign



Grand Inspector General Emeritus of the DC Scottish Rite, and in memory of his wife, Eleanor, who passed away in April 2015.

Award recipients will be chosen from a pool of qualified applicants at the discretion of the SIS Dean. The scholarship may be awarded either as a one time, non-renewable scholarship or offered as renewable from year to year, provided the student is enrolled at AU and meets the university's eligibility requirements for scholarship assistance.

"I deeply thank the donors who have made this possible," said Haji. "Without generous support from American University (AU), I would not have been able to pursue a graduate education."

IVERSEN SCHOLARSHIP RECOGNITION LUNCHEON at AMERICAN UNIVERSITY

n Tuesday, February 9, 2016, SGIG Emeritus Charles S. Iversen was feted at a special luncheon hosted by Dr. James Goldgeier, Dean of the School of International Service at American University. The event was in recognition of the scholarship established at the School by the DC Scottish Rite in the names of, and honoring Charles and his late wife, Eleanor.

At the time of the luncheon, the first Iversen Scholarship had already been awarded for the 2016 Spring Semester to a graduate student, Salman Haji, who is currently doing his course work in Istanbul, Turkey, and who briefly attended the gathering via Skype™. Mr. Haji told the audience how he had come to the United States from Tanzania as a child, and settled with his family in New Mexico. He also expressed his profound gratitude for the opportunity afforded him by the scholarship to continue his studies.

Dr. Goldgeier then provided an overview of the School of International Service, and its continuing popularity for both undergrad and graduate programs. Interestingly, he also stated that although in past years the School's graduates had been almost exclusively employed within the Federal sector; now, private industry and NGOs comprise the majority of graduate placements.

AMERICAN MILITARY SCOTTISH RITE BODIES NATO CLUB



stables in the city; one of which was at 14th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue NW, where the Wilson Building now stands. He began his Masonic career on November 11, 1870, when he was initiated into St. John's Lodge No. 11, and was raised therein on January 27, 1871. During the next five years, Brother Nailor took the degrees in the Chapter, Council, Commandery, and Scottish Rite, became a Noble at Almas Temple, and a member of the Royal Order of Scotland and the Red Cross of Constantine. Prior to his becoming a Mason, Brother Nailor had been active in Central Lodge No. 1, of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, where he was well-remembered for his service as Noble Grand during the Civil War years; and three-term president of the Oldest Inhabitants' Association.

As previously noted, Brother Nailor had been honored with the 33° at the biennial session of 1895, and had served as the representative to the Southern Jurisdiction Supreme Council from the Supreme Council of Mexico, to which he had been appointed as an honorary member by Mexican President Porfirio Diaz. In July 1903, Sovereign Grand Commander James D. Richardson appointed Brother Nailor as Grand Tiler to the Supreme Council; and with the death of long-time Secretary General Frederick Webber just after the biennial session of 1907, appointed Nailor to that office, as well.

Brother Nailor died at his elegant home at 15th Street and Rhode Island Avenue NW on January 2, 1908 in his seventy-second year, and was buried in Rock Creek Cemetery with Masonic services. His obituary in the *Evening Star* states that it was from his livery stable that John Wilkes Booth had rented the horse on which he had made his escape from Washington, but that bit of notoriety belongs to another stable owner, James W. Pumphrey, who operated his business at 6th and C Streets NW, a block from the old National Hotel at 6th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, where Booth had been staying. In the turmoil following President Lincoln's assassination, Pumphrey was arrested and jailed as a possible conspirator, but was soon exonerated and released.



Freemasonry has meant a lot of things. I believe that true Freemasons are truly the preservers of history, the leaders in their respective communities, learned men on a quest for more knowledge, and those who've chosen to honor a sacred bond uniting strangers into friends and brothers. There has been no better or more rewarding example of such an experience then my chance run-in with Aron Haddad, better known to the world as WWE Superstar, Damien Sandow.

I had known Aron for about 2 years at the time of our fateful interaction, and we always had a friendly relationship, but it wasn't until we sat down in for a meal backstage at the TD Garden in Boston before a show that we learned of each other's Masonic connection. Aron mentioned his charity work with Kosair Shriners near his home in Louisville, and I told him that I was Master of The Colonial Lodge, No. 1821 in DC. His face lightened up, he extended his hand across the table and we

Approximately a year later, and with the help of House of the Temple leadership, DC Scottish Rite, and the Valley of Louisville, Aron received his 32° and became a Master of the Royal Secret. The generous support of Sovereign Grand Commander Ronald A. Seale, collaboration between Len Proden, SGIG of the

District of Columbia and Roger Barnett, SGIG of Kentucky, and significant groundwork by Jason Van Dyke, 32° KCCH resulted in a wonderful day of degree conferrals (in which I was able participate) and fellowship: I would consider this a success if the story stopped here.

Since becoming a Master of the Royal Secret, I am pleased to report that Aron has been working on the Southern Jurisdiction's Master

VMAP UPDATE

MAP is designed to provide every Scottish Rite candidate, member and leader in our Valley with a useful working tool for planning and promoting a well-rounded series of activities to engage and involve every Member in the life and work of our Valley. As we come to the conclusion of the inaugural year of VMAP we reflect upon what the Valley has been able to accomplish by implementing the programs and requirements of this very worthwhile program.

Under the guidance of outstanding leadership and excellent participation by our members, the Valley successfully conferred two very successful Reunions during the year. The Spring 2015 Class immediately showed their commitment to our Valley by organizing and holding a Fundraiser that not only benefited our Scottish Rite Foundation but also brought together current members and potential new members. Prior to our Fall Reunion, the Valley hosted an Open House for prospective members and their families which peaked the interest of many who submitted petitions and are now our newest Scottish Rite Brothers from the Fall Class. At our Fall Reunion, the members of the Spring 2015 Class were presented with their 14th Degree Rings. Following the Reunion the new class enjoyed Fellowship with our Valley Leaders, Reunion participants and our Members during a Feast of Consistory.

In the area of Degree Conferral Proficiency, our Valley continues a great history of successful Degree Conferrals. Our Members continue to give their utmost effort to make the Reunions something that our Candidates will remember for the rest of their lifetimes. Many hours of rehearsal and planning went into each Reunion and it shows. Behind the scenes the wardrobe department, stage crew and technology departments strived to enhance all aspects of the Degrees. Under the Leadership of our Director of Work, Ill. Bill Rule, 33°, we continued to add new Degrees. At the Fall reunion, a cast composed of Members of the Knights of St. Andrew did an excellent job in conferring the 28th Degree.

As Masonic Education is an integral part of the Scottish Rite and VMAP we continue to offer programs to benefit our Members and our Candidates. Our newly made Scottish Rite Masons were presented with copies of *A Bridge to Light and Morals and Dogma* and encouraged to pursue further Light in Masonry by enrolling in the Master Craftsmen courses taught by **Brother Walter Benesch**, 32° KCCH and/or the College of Philosophy taught by **Ill. Pierre Gaujard**, 33° and **Ill. Mensah R. Adjogah**, 33°. These programs are open to all Scottish Rite Masons. These are just some of the opportunities for Masonic Education in addition to presentations which are made at our Valley's stated as well as special communications.

Our Valley KCCH Club, under the direction of Co-Chairmen Brother Marlon Curtis 32°, KCCH and Brother Teddy Kerefa-Smart, 32° KCCH, has been instrumental in Membership Engagement and Membership Retention. In the Fall, the KCCH Club Members reached out to all of our 80 and older Members in any effort to follow up with these Brothers who may not be able to attend our communications and events as much as they used to. Many of these calls were very rewarding for the KCCH Brothers and the phone call recipients as well. In some cases we found that sometimes something as simple as a ride is all that the Brother needed to have him back at an event with his Brothers.

Program is an area that encompasses many of the VMAP achievements including New Member Engagement, Recruitment, Education and Reunion Experience. Each of our Red Cap Mentors was assigned one or more Candidates at our Fall Reunion and will Mentor them throughout the year.
