2017 Grand Master of Masons: Most Worshipful Brother Roman Volsky, 33°

R oman Volsky was born in Odessa, Ukraine.

He graduated the Odessa Marine Engineering University with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. After a brief period of service with the Soviet Navy, he worked as a chief power supply engineer at a Black Sea seaport, and later established a private publishing company in his hometown, managing it until December of 1990, when he immigrated to the United States and became a US Citizen.

In 1995, he formed a full-service media and publishing firm, which serves the US government, private industries, and international clientele, providing printed and digital material in various languages. An accomplished linguist,

holding the highest certifications as an interpreter in the Russian language, Roman also provides linguistic services to Federal and State government agencies, courts, and the private sector.

Brother Volsky became a Freemason in 1997, when he was initiated, passed and raised in Benjamin B. French Lodge No.15 in Washing-

ton, DC, where he served as Master in 2004. He remains an active member of his mother Lodge and is involved in its many programs. Worshipful Brother Volsky is also an active member of The Colonial Lodge No. 1821, which awarded him their Fidelity Medal in 2014.

Most Worshipful Brother Volsky began his Grand Lodge service with appointments as Grand Sword Bearer in 2008, and Grand Marshal in 2009, following which, he was elected to the officer line as Junior Grand Steward in 2010. In 2012, he received the Valentine Reintzel Medal for Meritorious Service from the Grand Lodge.

Illustrious Brother Volsky is also active in the Scottish Rite's Valley of Washington, Orient of the District of Columbia, having served as the Venerable

Master of its Albert Pike Consistory in 2007. And that same year, he was coroneted as a 33° Inspector General Honorary of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite – Southern Jurisdiction.

Most Worshipful Brother Volsky and his wife Tatyana are the proud parents of two daughters.

2017 Potentate of Almas Shriners: Illustrious Sir Michael Gordon, 32°

Illustrious Sir Michael A. Gordon currently serves as the Deputy Corporate Informa-L tion Security Officer (CISO) and Director of Intelligence & Operations within Lockheed Martin's Corporate Information Security organization. In this capacity Mike is responsible for the overall Computer Network Defense of the Lockheed Martin computing infrastructure. He has nearly twenty years of experience in the information security field supporting the Defense Industrial Base, and has also been a security consultant for the Public, Health and Financial sectors. Brother Gordon has been engaging in ongoing activities with governments around the world to facilitate multilateral, cross-sector cyber security information sharing.





IN AND ABOUT THE TEMPLE: THE UNSINKABLE JOHN MILLS BROWNE

s part of the ongoing process to return artifacts important to the history of the DCSR to the walls of our Temple, you may have noticed the most recent addition opposite the SGIG's office. It is a portrait of Ill. John Mills Browne, 33°, SGIG from 1880 until 1889, his term of office being between those of Albert Gallatin Mackey and Albert Pike, two luminaries of Scottish Rite Freemasonry.

Brother Browne was born in New Hampshire in 1831, graduated from the Medical School of Harvard University in 1852, and appointed an Assistant Surgeon in the United States Navy the following year. His first duty station was aboard the USS Warren, a stores ship anchored at Sausalito, CA. In September 1854, the Warren moved to Mare Island to serve as the residence of the first Commandant of the Navy Yard established there, Commander David Glasgow Farragut: Assistant Surgeon Browne became, in turn, the first medical officer at the Mare Island Navy Yard.

John Mills Browne was made a Mason on June 3, 1852, in Philesian Lodge No. 40 at Winchester, New Hampshire, where he received all three degrees in one day under dispensation from the Grand Master because of his impending removal from the area for naval service. During his time in California, he affiliated with Naval Lodge No. 87 at Vallejo, California, where he was Master in 1870. He served as Grand Master of California Masons from 1874-1876, and was active in the Scottish Rite. Brother Browne was invested with the KCCH in 1872, coroneted Inspector General Honorary, 33° in 1876, and crowned an active member of the Supreme Council in 1880; whereupon he assumed leadership of the Rite in the District of Columbia.

According to a brief history of DC Scottish Rite Freemasonry, prepared in 1940 by Ill. William L. Boyden, 33°, for the dedication of the Temple at 2800 16th St NW, "under his (Browne's) administration, the Rite

made rapid strides." Among those being the constitution of a second Lodge of Perfection in Georgetown, and the acquisition of property and construction of the first permanent home of the DC Scottish Rite Bodies, their Cathedral at 1007 G St. NW.

As previously noted, Brother Browne's appointment as Surgeon General of the Navy came while he was serving as SGIG. Therefore, in August 1889, "in consequence of the pressure of his official duties as Surgeon General of the Navy, and the necessity of his frequent absence from the City ...he requested the Grand

Commander to relieve him of those duties as Inspector General." Brother Browne continued those official duties until he retired from office in 1893. He died on December 7, 1894 and interred at Arlington National Cemetery: the jewel of the 33° appears on his tombstone.



After subsequent service in survey vessels in the Pacific Northwest, Brother Browne received a promotion to Passed Assistant Surgeon in 1858, and saw service as medical officer on the USS Dolphin, and the USS Constellation during their missions of interdiction of ships involved in the slave trade. Commissioned Surgeon in June 1861, and assigned as senior medical officer on the USS Kearsarge, he was aboard when she sank the Confederate raider, CSS Alabama, in June 1864. Following the War, and returned to California, Surgeon Browne oversaw construction of the Naval Hospital, Mare Island, and from 1872 to 1875, served as Fleet Surgeon of the Pacific Fleet. His promotions had continued, and his next assignment was to Washington, DC, where he was President of the Medical Examining Board, a member of the Board of Visitors of the United States Naval Academy, and a representative to the 1881 Medical Congress in London. President Grover Cleveland



appointed him Surgeon General of the Navy on April 2, 1888, which office he held until May 10, 1893.

Our newly made Scottish Rite Masons were presented with copies of *A Bridge to Light* and *Morals and Dogma* and encouraged to pursue further Light in Masonry by enrolling in the Master Craftsmen courses taught by Brother Walter Benesch 32°KCCH and/or the College of Philosophy taught by Ill. Brother Pierre Gaugard 33°. These programs are open to all Scottish Rite Masons. These are just some of the opportunities for Masonic Education in addition to presentations which are made at our Valley's stated as well as special communications.

Our Valley KCCH Club, under the direction of Chairman Marlon Curtis 32° KCCH, has been instrumental in Membership Engagement and Membership Retention. Our Valley Mentoring Program is an area that encompasses many of the VMAP achievements including New Member Engagement, Recruitment, Education and Reunion Experience. Each of our Red Cap Mentors was assigned one or more Candidates at our Reunions and will Mentor them throughout the year. The responsibilities of the Mentors include not only an introduction of our newly made Scottish Rite Brethren to our Valley and its Members but to find out their areas of interest and inform them of all the different aspects of the Scottish Rite and the many ways they can become and stay involved in the life of our Valley.

Our Valley continues to thrive in the area of Philanthropy and Public Image. In November, the Valley hosted our Education and Community Service Awards Program to recognize those who were award-ТΜ ed scholarships from the Valley and those who were recognized for their outstanding achievements in service to our community. The Education Committee's outstanding efforts came to fruition, as the Valley was able to provide scholarships to 19 very deserving students. The KSA, under the direction of Chieftain George Perez, 32° continues to do an incredible job of service and support to our Valley. Brethren Behind the Scenes: Our Valley's Directors of Work

recently came upon an undated paper presented to the Pythagoras Lodge of Research by Ill. Ralph H. Gauker, 33°, author of the centennial *History of the Scottish Rite Bodies in the District of Columbia*, entitled "Established facts about the sequence of Directors of Work in D.C." When I mentioned this find to the SGIG, he suggested that I bring it up to date as an article for the *Progress*.


For those of you who are new to the Scottish Rite, the Director of Work is in overall charge of the presentation of degrees at our Reunions, and that position here at DCSR is currently occupied by Ill. William T. Rule II, 33°. Brother Bill has a Deputy, two Assistants, and five Degree Directors, one for each of the obligatory degrees required by the Supreme Council, to help him in this non-trivial undertaking. Additionally, he has the support of the Stage Crew, including sound and lighting, and the Master of Wardrobe for costumes and accessories.

Brother Gauker's piece begins in 1904 with the appointment of Brother Francis Elton Sheiry as Director of Work by Brother Henry Ridgely Evans, then Venerable Master of Mithras Lodge of Perfection. At this distance in time, this seems somewhat remarkable given that Brother Sheiry had only joined the Rite in 1902, and so must have been particularly adept at dramatic presentations, or management thereof. In any case, by III. Carroll J. Collins, 33°, General Secretary

Brother Sheiry was the first and last person to bear the title until 1921. During the interim years, there were Degree Masters and Degree Directors, but no Director of Work. Interestingly, Ill. Henry Ridgely Evans, 33°, was an amateur student of magic, and acquaintance of Harry Houdini. Described as a "...hobbyist performer but... clearly a professional magic historian," he wrote and published a number of books on that subject.

A Standing Resolution, adopted in June 1905, assigned the three top officers of Mithras Lodge as "a committee on work with authority to appoint a Degree Master for one year." This selection method remained until 1909 when that right transferred to the newly formed Executive Committee. Still, it was not until January 1921 that the position was formally entitled Director of Work, and Ill. George Roscoe Davis, 33°, appointed thereto. As an aside, Brother Davis had been a distinguished scholar of Latin, Greek, and Mathematics while a student at The George Washington University, and was the sole recipient of a B.A. degree from that institution in 1895. He subsequently worked as an attorney at the Pension Bureau and the Treasury Department before going into private practice.

In December 1921, Ill. John Henry von Herrmann, 33°, succeeded Brother Davis as Director of Work, but his time in that position ended with



his sudden death by apoplexy in June 1922. At this point, Brother Gauker injected a bit of confusion into the line of succession. In his paper, he lists Brother Charles Barnum Hanford as following Brother von Herrmann, but in his History, he indicates that Ill. Frank Michael Roller, 33°, former Grand Lecturer, was next. Brother Roller was a well-known ritualist in the DC Masonic community, as well as in other local fraternal organizations, but the public at large was more familiar with the name of Brother Hanford. Attracted to the stage as a young man, he gained notoriety as a talented Shakespearean actor, and performed with some of the best in that genre during the last decades of the nineteenth century, including Edwin Booth. The high point of Brother Hanford's term as Director of Work may well have been his presentation of the 20th degree in May 1926 when he had eight DC Past Grand Masters and the Grand Chaplain in the cast. This was also Brother Hanford's last significant contribution to the Valley's dramatic work, as he died of acute appendicitis, made inoperable by his chronic cardiac asthma condition, on October 16.

The Executive Committee appointed Ill. John Carpenter Palmer, 33° as Degree Director after Brother Hanford's death, and the aforementioned Brother Roller as Assistant Degree Director. The position title reverted to Director of Work following the passing of Brother Palmer, and Ill. Evan Jones, 33°, acceded thereto. When Brother Jones died in an automobile accident in July 1951, the Executive Committee picked Ill. Frederic Barton Blackburn, 33°, to replace him. After a dozen years, Brother Blackburn resigned and Ill. Renah F. Camalier, 33°, Deputy of the Supreme Council for DC recommended Ill. Raymond Barton Harding, 33°, to the Executive Committee as his replacement. Brother Harding was to become the longest-serving Director of Work in DCSR history, performing thus from his appointment in 1963, until his death in June 1983.

With Brother Harding's death, Ill. William D. Jackson, 33°, who had been an Assistant Degree Director under Brother Harding, moved into the Director's role. In 1992, Ill. Kenneth M. Meyer, 33°, also an Assistant under Brother Harding, replaced Brother Jackson who, upon his retirement, received the honorific of Director of Work, Emeritus. From 1999 through 2001, Dan L. Frederick, 32° KCCH and Donald H. Larson, 32° KCCH, shared the position as Co-Directors. Ill. Roy E. Revis, 33° became Director of Work in 2002, and remained so until succeeded in 2007 by Ill. Charles W. Wagner, 33°. Our current Director, Ill. William T. Rule II, 33°, took over from Brother Wagner in 2014. 4
