
















In and About the Temple

ver the past few months, we have had some serious restoration work being done on the colorful mosaic, doors, and metal surround of the Grand Entrance to our Temple as well as to the urns that flank it. That effort is now complete, and what is now displayed must certainly closely match if not equal that which was revealed on the spring day in 1940 when the building was first dedicated for use.

The mosaic and urns are of an artform known as the Earley Process, after its inventor John Joseph Earley (1881-1945), a Washington stone carver and ecclesiastical artist who contributed to several

projects in the District including Meridian Hill Park, Dumbarton Bridge, and the Willard Hotel. The proscenium in our auditorium on which are displayed the primary symbols of the degrees of our Scottish Rite is another example of the Earley Process, also known as polychrome cement.

Porter-Lockie-Chatelain was the architectural firm responsible for the design of our building, and in the September 1940 issue of the *Bulletin*, Brother Irwin

S. Porter of that firm described the Grand Entrance in an article entitled, "Architecture Speaks Through the Language of Symbolism in the Scottish Rite Temple at Washington, D.C." We plan to present Brother Porter's article in the Fall edition of the *Bulletin*, complete with photographs of the symbols described therein.

On the immediate horizon is replacement of the carpeting and stage flooring of the auditorium. Over time, we have had suggestions from several artists that have performed here that a hard surface in the stage area would greatly increase audience appreciation through the improved acoustics that such a surface would offer; so, we are going with a chevron-patterned, sandalwood colored vinyl laminate stage and complementary carpeting on the steps, entrance well, and mezzanine landing.

As part of this overall renewal, attention has also been given to the organ loft to provide a more suitable setting for the new organ installed several months ago. Removal of the old organ chimes, thorough cleaning, wall patching, and painting have been completed, and we are awaiting the carpet tiles to redo the floor.


We have promised that when we do not attend meetings of the Rite we will not withhold our relief of the poor.

A Brief Look at Reunions Past

n November 7, 2020, the Valley of Washington held their first "hybrid reunion." This unique event featured a significantly pared down degree cast and a mix of in-person and virtual lectures. While the single-day event required all to follow distancing guidelines, it served as a welcomed respite to the regular lockdown-focused routine. As we mark the valley's special achievement let's take a brief look back at some other notable reunions from our institution's past.

For the first two decades, the District's Scottish Rite bodies conferred their respective degrees at their own discretion. Body leadership determined degree cycle schedules and candidates often waited months or years to apply across the four bodies. This changed around the Fall of 1892 when leadership agreed to host a week-long conferral event, which they dubbed a *reunion*. They believed the innovation would improve the initiatic experience and promote better unity between the bodies.

The first reunion began on Tuesday, October 11, 1892 at the Scottish Rite Cathedral on 1006 G Street, N.W. Candidates witnessed an exemplification of the first three degrees of





Freemasonry in Scottish Rite ritual. Mithras Lodge of Perfection then opened to receive candidates and confer the fourth through eighth degrees. Mithras reopened the following evening and candidates received the ninth through the fourteenth degrees. On Thursday night, Evangelist Chapter Rose Croix opened and, after the customary ballot, candidates received their fifteenth through eighteenth degrees. Robert De Bruce Council of Kadosh opened on Friday night and the process repeated with the nineteenth and thirtieth degrees. The reunion concluded on Saturday, October 15, with Albert Pike Consistory. Candidates received the thirty-first degree and retired to the cathedral's refectory for a banquet and to imbibe in several ceremonial toasts. The evening concluded with the thirty-second degree conferral.

The first reunion's success enabled leadership to continue the practice annually, especially into the early twentieth century as class sizes often reached over one hundred candidates. Reunions eventually evolved into a proxy masonic "homecoming" event that enabled busy or sojourning members a chance to reconnect, participate, and meet the valley's newest members. The schedule also aligned nicely with the Supreme Council's biennial sessions and records note that Grand Commanders and other Supreme Council officers visited local reunions.

Additional improvements were made over time to streamline the process. Reunions moved to a semi-annual schedule and held in the Spring and Fall seasons. The shift eased class size burdens and enabled eager masons to join degree conferral teams. The four bodies implemented a unified petition, payment scheme, and agreed to cast a single ballot to be valid across all four bodies, which eliminated redundancy and tedious business during busy nights. The degree cycle also evolved and certain degrees were omitted outright

he year 2020 changed a lot of things for us, it changed the way we work, it changed the way we socialize, and it changed the way we approach hygiene. But one of the most interesting impacts the pandemic had on the general population was our cadence of everyday life.


While yes, a lot of people have learned how to work out better at home, there has been a wider impact of the way we as a country respond to working out. A new study that analyzes the effect the fast-spreading respiratory disease had on our lifestyle habits and, more specifically, our exercise, reveals that after being stuck working out inside for so long, we're heading outside instead.

RunRepeat, a review site focused on athletic shoes, analyzed the impact of the pandemic on the fitness industry and found that 59.1% of survey participants found that exercise including running, hiking, walking, and cycling was the best way to achieve their fitness goals.

What is more, a British Medical Journal (BMJ) study explored how the pandemic (despite its economic and societal destruction) may have led to the population having an interest in working out more so than ever.

The data in the study suggests that "despite challenges to an active lifestyle, the COVID-19

lockdown may have led to increases in population-level interest in and engagement with physical activity. Potential explanations for the relative increase in exercise interest include compensation for reduced incidental activities, availability of discretionary time, increased health awareness and ubiquitous messages recommending exercise during COVID-19 from media, governments and health authorities."



Another survey found that 62% of adults also considered that staying active is more important now than before the pandemic, and that those exercising regularly have been after expert help more than ever, with 47.5% of people hiring personal trainers and nutritionists.

Here's to a (hopefully) healthier future.

due to time constraints. By the 1970s, reunions transformed from week-long events into two-to-three day conferrals, often held on the weekends.

To mark the Valley's Centennial Anniversary, Deputy Sovereign Grand Inspector General Renah Camalier, Grand Cross, held a special one-day reunion on October 24, 1970. Four-hundred and seventy eight candidates participated in the reunion, which was composed of forty-four candidates from District lodges, twenty-seven from Maryland, seventeen from Virginia, thirty-one from other states, and four from foreign jurisdictions - Germany, Italy,

Japan, and Okinawa. The program began at approximately 6:30 a.m. and wrapped up around 9:30 p.m. Staff prepared and distributed around seven-hundred lunches and dinners that day, and participants ate in two shifts.

While the technology, process, and logistics have changed considerably since 1892, our Valley's reunions remain great opportunities for masons to perform or witness the degrees, meet new members, and practice the virtues enshrined in our ritual. One can only imagine what future masons will see in 2070 at our Valley's bicentennial.

The Desire for More Light

Men cannot afford to go through life with gloves on their hands or shackles on their minds, or blinders on their eyes, for what we do and say blossoms or dies according to our contributions, while those whose lives we touch will succeed or fail because we open a door or we do not, or say a word or perform an act, or we do not, to throw a stumbling block across life's pathway, or to give someone a lift or an inspiration to carry on.

Scottish Rite Freemasonry engineers creativity. It says to men, go forth into the world leaving fingerprints of your creative accomplishment on sound and worthwhile objectives, especially the lives of men.

Is it not our bounden duty to open the door whereby desire for more light might be awakened in the minds and hearts of others, that penetrating light found in Scottish Rite Freemasonry, where man's dream is — "not to be better than his neighbor, but to be better than himself"?

Axis Mundi ("Center of the World") Relocated to DCSR Temple!

ast October, a metal sculpture was installed in front of and at the southeast corner of the DCSR Temple. Since we ✓ have not previously provided information about this work, the following is a description in the words of the artist, Kate Raudenbush (www.kateraudenbush.com):

"Axis Mundi is a futuristic steel obelisk grounded in Washington, D.C. as a reminder of our living Democracy. When I was first asked to create a sculpture in Washington, D.C. by the Golden Triangle

Business Improvement District, the first step in my design process was to understand where it would live. You cannot create form unless you understand space. I've been fascinated by the layout of the city of Washington, D.C. for many years (I was also born in DC), and knew that this majestic city was not just about the seat of government and its buildings, it was about the arrangement of public space. When one consciously arranges space, street grids, parks, visual landmarks, and views, you arrange the rhythm and flow of energy and people. So, I was elated to discover that the artwork would be originally placed on the intersection of Connecticut and K St NW, by Farragut West park. This meant that it was on the star grid of the city plan by Freemason Pierre Charles L'Enfant. Thus, the conceptual groundwork of the city itself became the foundation for Axis Mundi.

But I feel a public artwork must do more than restate the obvious. It must attempt to reach higher and offer

both a symbol and an aspiration. With Axis Mundi, I sought to draw inspiration from the past, think of the future, while reflecting and honoring the present moment.

Axis Mundi is Latin for "world center" an apt description for the feel of Washington, D.C. In a broad view, Axis Mundi is about place and people, past and present, container and contained, structure and society. In a local view, its obelisk form refers to the city's central Washington Monument, it is a symbol that connects earth and sky, like a beam of the light of the world's first democracy: "out of many, one."

Axis Mundi's obelisk laser-cut work designs reflect the star pattern of the city streets, represented in the lower section, uniting with the stars in the sky above, in the sculpture's peak. This refers to the Hermetic Principle of Correspondence with the axiom "as above, so below," as it describes the resonant relationship of the patterns

> of the micro and macro planes of existence.

> At the center of the sculpture, the mirrored surface of the 24" diameter stainless steel sphere reflects the entire world around it, as it exists in real time. Thus, the sphere inside Axis Mundi reflects the living democracy that forms the heart of this city: it reflects "We the People." The rest of the axiom of the Principle of Correspondence reads: "As within, so without; as without, so within." In this way, the sphere represents the element of immediacy and direct participation that is necessary to make this country's democracy truly great. It is also clear that we must have integrity within leadership to inspire integrity in the whole.

With Axis Mundi internal lighting, I wanted to illustrate the higher sense of place and purpose that the city of Washington, D.C. was meant to embody. People come here from around the world to collaborate with our government, visit our museums and

monuments to our ideals, and take inspiration from our founding documents. It is here that our democratic principles are enshrined. Yet, Democracy is not just an idea, it is a practice. It is an energetic sense of purpose that is upheld by all of us: in the everyday actions of our citizens and leadership. That is what is reflected in the core of this artwork: Us. We are the living, evolving democracy of the United States. Our honest participation is required for it to work, so our efforts can be a light for others."

IN MEMORIAM: ILL. J. PHILLIP LONDON, 33°

The light of Freemasonry in the District of Columbia has been diminished by the loss of our Brother, Ill. J. Phillip London, 33°, who passed to the Celestial Lodge on January 18, 2021 at age 82. Jack, as he was known since his days at the U.S. Naval Academy, received the degrees of Freemasonry in the Grand Master's Class in the Fall of 2001 as a member of Benjamin B. French Lodge No. 15. Although his position as the top executive officer at a multi-billion dollar company took up much of his time, he was able to maintain a level of Masonic activity both in Cincinnatus Lodge No. 76, with which he had affiliated in 2006, and the DC Scottish Rite where he had taken the degrees in 2001.

Brother London took his Masonry seriously, and was an frequent advocate for the Fraternity in both his spoken words and his published works. The DC Scottish Rite recognized his passion for the Fraternity with the honors of 32° KCCH in 2003, and Inspector General Honorary 33° in 2015.





IN MEMORIAM: ILL. KENNETH D. FULLER, 33°

It is with great sadness that we announce the death of our Brother, Ill. Kenneth D. Fuller, 33° of Pottstown, Pennsylvania who passed away on February 23, 2021, at the age of 74. He was born in New Britain, Connecticut, and attended school in nearby Plainville. A graduate of Davidson College and Harvard Divinity School, Ken was ordained in the United Church of Christ. A member of the Order of DeMolay while in high school, Brother Fuller later received the degrees of Freemasonry in the District of Columbia at William R. Singleton-Hope-Lebanon Lodge No. 7 in 1998. After having served as Master of his Lodge in 2005, Brother Ken was elected as Junior Grand Steward in 2006. He advanced to the office of Junior Grand Deacon before being called to a church in Connecticut in 2009. Upon his return to the District, he was again elected to the Grand Line, becoming Grand Master in 2016. Illustrious Fuller was invested as a 32° KCCH in 2007, coroneted a 33° Inspector General Honorary in 2017 and served as the Venerable Master of Mithras Lodge of Perfection in 2018.


